VALE ELIZABETH WEBB

The Glenreagh community is well known for it's active volunteering and it's common unity of purpose. This is achieved by many....but epitomized by one very special lady who died last week, Elizabeth Webb.

Our dear Bessie achieved 103 (and three quarters) years of life. Her earliest memory was, as a three-year-old, sitting on her mother's knee and listening to her father recite a poignant Banjo Patterson poem in the Glenreagh Hall. Tom Holder, Bessie's father, was a wise man whose life revealed his two favourite family adages:-

- You have to care for your neighbour;
- The world has to be just a tiny bit better because you've been here.



Bessie was born in 1922 and lived up Tallawudjah Creek, west of Glenreagh, until she was 16. Her primary schooling was two days one week and three days the next as the teacher was shared between another small school. She did not have any high schooling but went on to research local history, write many books, compose poetry, remind politicians of their duty and ensure that all the organisations that she belonged to remain true to their purpose.

VALE ELIZABETH WEBB

The Holders moved to a small farm at Southgate, near Grafton, in 1938. Bessie met Les Webb in 1942, and they were married in 1944. Over 100 of Bessie's family filled the Grafton Cathedral for the wedding ceremony but only Les was the representative from the Webb side. He was from a very small family and it was during the second World War when travel was difficult.

The indomitable Bessie left her family behind and headed for the south coast of NSW with the love of her life, Les. They turned their hand to farming, mainly dairying, in Unundera, Kangaroo Valley, Penrith and Llandilo. Les was fitter-and-turner, so he worked on-and-off the farm

until his retirement when they were running two school buses. The four Webb children, Robyn (1945), Lyn (1949), Peter (1953) and Jen (1962) were born during this time and Bessie was actively involved in all their schooling and recreation. She was also a founding member of the Nepean Family History and an active member of the Anglican Church.



In 1981 Les and Bessie fully retired and moved to Glenreagh. This was more of a case of re-tyred than relaxed retirement. Some of the organisations that Bessie was involved in were:-

Bessie always held out the Digger's hat at the breakfast in the Hall after the ANZAC Day dawn service....and nobody sidled past to ignore her intention.

VALE ELIZABETH WEBB

A few years ago we chose the humble, but all-important, APRON as our special section in Glenreagh's annual Cedar and Steam art and photo exhibition. Bessie told me that she had some beautiful aprons from her trousseau that her mother had made in 1944. When I went around to photograph the aprons I was surprised...but not really surprised.. to find that Bessie was wearing one of the aprons while she was cooking a batch of jam drops for the photography exercise. While the biscuits baked Bessie modelled many of her aprons. Afterwards we enjoyed a cuppa and then Bessie packed away the remaining biscuits so she could take them up to the school canteen for the students.

In the last few years of Bessie's life she was slowed down by some minor strokes. Although her speech was affected she was still able to ensure that we were doing the right thing in the Museum and ensuring that the integrity of the research was maintained. Bessie remained in her own home, almost to the end, thanks to the caring rotational visits from her children.

On the last day of her earthly life she read out the mindfulness card for the day- I AM LOVED FOR BEING WHO I AM -UNIQUELY ME. And truly, our unique Bessie was loved by all...and we are all the better for having known a lady who left this world....not just a tiny bit better...but a lot better because she had been here.



There will be a community Celebration of the beautiful life of Bessie at 11am on Thursday 19th March in the Glenreagh Hall.

Part 3. Continuation from January edition.

Last month we read that Jesus was slain at the hand of the Roman Governor of Israel. This was because they were the only people who were allowed to execute criminals. His would-be friend, Judas Iscariot, betrayed him to the soldiers. Witnesses lied against him. Pontius Pilate attempted to save him, but failed, so he washed his hands of his death, yet still committed him to be crucified on a cross. The Cross has become a symbol of Christianity.

Easter is celebrated over four days. Maundy Thursday is the night that Jesus ate The Passover Meal with his disciples. He washed their feet, the work of a servant, to show them what his servanthood really meant. Jesus was their teacher and a place of honour. With this act, Jesus showed that no one is greater than another. You should not exalt yourself, to think that this act of hospitality, is below your assumed status. To be a servant of God is to be a servant of all. Jesus made this meal a memorial of his life, that would be given the next day, Good Friday, as payment for sin. Not his, but humanities sins. When Adam and Eve were in the Garden of Eden, they were told that if they ate of the Tree of Good and Evil, they would surely die. They ate and death came to be. Jesus died in place of us, the pure and holy for the disobedient. The Bread and the Wine of the meal were given to the disciples as physical symbols of his Body and Blood. Celebrated from that time forward, by Christians, this is known as The Eucharist or The Last Supper. Saturday, some Churches, hold Vigils in participation of the disciples' time together in fear and prayer after his execution. Then, on the Sunday, we remember the resurrection of Jesus. The day that God, the Father, raised him to life, overcoming the power of death, and open the way for us to receive Eternal life, through faith. Each Gospel gives us differing information, but the main message is always the same. A woman/women visited the tomb first. The angel/s said he is not here. He is risen and will come to them. The first evangelist/s are always female taking this message back to the others.

Known to locals as Bessie Webb, Elizabeth Isabell OAM, was ascending her 104th birthday, and until January had been able to remain in her own home, with assistance from a very devoted and loving family and friends. Bessie & Les, her husband, had very strong faiths in God and were instrumental in repair work to the Anglican, Christ Church. Bessie showed her faith by her actions to support people in need and to advance the infrastructure of the Glenreagh Village. She was a member of the Lion's Club, the Museum, Progress Association, and Church Committee. Bessie had a ready wit, was a poet and wrote numerous books on the history of the area. Her smiling face will be missed by all who were blessed to know her.

RIP Bessie.

PAY DAY SUPER

Payday Super legislation comes into effect on 1 July 2026 in Australia — this article gives a brief outline of what it is, how it changes existing rules, and what businesses should do now to prepare.

1. What payday super is

Payday Super is a reform to the compulsory superannuation guarantee (“SG”) system that changes when employers must pay super contributions for employees.

Key change starting 1 July 2026:

- Employers will be required to pay superannuation contributions at the same time they pay an employee’s salary or wages — rather than quarterly as under the current system.
- The contributions must generally be received by the employee’s super fund within 7 business days of payday (subject to limited exceptions such as for new employees).

The objective of this reform is to:

- reduce unpaid or late super contributions,
- boost retirement savings outcomes for employees,
- allow employees to see super contributions in near real-time, and
- improve regulatory visibility and compliance.

2. How this differs from current rules

Under the existing Superannuation Guarantee rules:

- Employers can pay super contributions quarterly — generally by the due date of the quarter’s super guarantee contribution (e.g., late July for April–June quarter).
-

Under Payday Super from 1 July 2026:

- Super must be calculated and paid each pay cycle (weekly, fortnightly, monthly) aligned with salary payments.
- Contributions must reach the employee’s chosen super fund within 7 business days of payday.
- The ATO will match Single Touch Payroll (STP) reports and super contributions to check compliance.
- Late or missing super may result in Superannuation Guarantee Charge (SGC) liabilities and penalties without the current late payment offset.
- The ATO’s Small Business Superannuation Clearing House (SBSCH) will close on 30 June 2026, so employers must transition to alternative payment channels before the reform starts.

3. What employers should do before 1 July 2026

A. Review and Upgrade Payroll & Systems

- Ensure your payroll software can calculate SG contributions for every pay cycle and handle the new timing.
- Check that payment and data reporting processes are set up to align SG contributions with pay runs.
- Confirm that your system can process the funds so they are received by the super fund within the required timeframe.

B. Address Operational and Data Issues

- Validate super fund details (TFN, USI, account details) for all employees to reduce rejected payments or delays.
- Update internal policies and procedures to reflect:
 1. per-pay-period SG calculations,
 2. recordkeeping requirements,
 3. exception handling (e.g., new employee first contributions).

C. Cash Flow and Financial Planning

- Assess and plan for potential impacts on business cash flow, especially if you have traditionally used quarterly super payments.
- Budget for more frequent payments, which can affect timing of outflows.

D. Transition From SBSCH

- Move away from the ATO's Small Business Superannuation Clearing House before it closes.
- Review and engage with an alternative clearing house or payroll provider that supports frequent SG payments.

E. Train and Communicate

- Train payroll, HR and finance teams on how Payday Super will work operationally.
- Communicate with employees about the change in timing and the effect on their super reporting.

F. Seek Professional Advice (if needed)

- Engage with your accountant, payroll software provider, or a registered tax advisor well ahead of July 2026 to make sure your systems and processes are compliant.
