HONOUR ROLL DEDICATION

For many years, the Glenreagh Progress Association discussed recognising people from our local area by engraving their names, taken from the honour roll board in the hall, outside and onto marble, so that they can be seen by everyone.

The purpose of this project was simple: we must ensure those who served, and who gave us the freedom and the way of life we enjoy today, are not forgotten.

Following discussions with Universal Marble in Woolgoolga, and an approved grant from NSW Government, lodged by Clarence Valley Council on our behalf, the project was "all a go".

On the 18th April 2026 the Glenreagh Progress Association unveiled the commemorative plinths that contain the names of those who were Glenreagh community members who appear on the Honour Scrolls in the School of Arts hall.

With the Glenreagh Progress Association looking at plans for the School of Arts Hall, and the NSW Government advertising community grants, the concept for the monuments was taking to Universal Marble. While this kind of work was completely new for UVM, Bill Singh and the team got right behind the idea and took it on. Extra shout out to Daniel Shoobert for all his care and commitment to this wonderful project.

The event on Saturday was well attended by community members and some relatives of those on the rolls. A poppy was placed for each name on the plinths by relatives and community members. The plinths were unveiled by Dot Teale and Shaun Christie and a wreath was laid by the local member Richie Williamson MP. The Clarence Valley Mayor Ray Smith was also in attendance and laid a poppy for one of the names on the roll. The ceremony was narrated by Les O'Heir, a local Lions Club member, assisted by Noel Backman, OAM. Pastoral input was given by Reverend Ruth Pobjoy. After the event, afternoon tea was provided by the ladies of the Orara Valley CWA. Attendance at the ceremony was estimated to be about 100 community members, Valley residents and visitors. The organisers would like to express their appreciation for the support shown to this event. Next Saturday marks the 110th anniversary of the first ANZAC Day and 2026 marks the 75th Anniversary of National Service.

CEDAR & STEAM

Glenreagh Museum has been putting on an annual art and photography exhibition since 2007. Although the whistle of the steam engine and the harvesting of the red cedar were important elements of our history, the exhibition is called CEDAR AND STEAM to memorialize our past. This year we have ventured into new territory by holding the exhibition over three days in June... instead of the usual two days. When we tried a Sunday opening years ago it was unsuccessful. You could have a shot a gun up the main street without hitting anyone on a Sunday in those days! Now, even with the increased fuel costs and fuel shortages, Glenreagh has attracted more visitors and locals to venture out and about on a Sunday. So this year's Cedar and Steam exhibition will be held on Friday evening the 26th, Saturday the 27th and Sunday 28th June.

The Hall will be full to overflowing with colourful creativity. Five categories of artistic expression will be on display- PHOTOGRAPHY, PAINTING, DRAWING, FIBRE AND 3D SCULPTURE from youth under 18 and all other ages. Each year we have a special category. This year it is PUPPETS! These can be entered using any medium. Puppets can be painted or drawn, photographed or sculpted. Puppets could be made from a sock or a paper bag. They could be made to fit on a finger or jump out of a box. There could be shadow puppets or marionettes operated by strings. These are art works that capture movement to tell a story.



All of the Orara Valley primary schools and the local homeschoolers are invited to participate in the exhibition. Their theme this year is PUPPETS also. We are always amazed at the creative talents of our young people and their wonderfully imaginative and inspiring teachers.

Two guest artists have been invited to display a sample of their work. Wayne Wilson will have string line remote controlled model aeroplanes. And Guy Gilmore will have a retrospective display of his colourful paintings depicting local folk in our local area. There will also be two tables of model steam engines thanks to Emma Ritson from the Shannondale Steam Shed.

WORKERS COMPENSATION IN NSW

Workers Compensation is governed by state legislation. This article focuses on NSW requirements.

Workers compensation insurance is a legal requirement for most employers.

You must obtain workers compensation insurance as soon as you employ a worker (unless an exemption applies). This applies even if:

- You employ only one worker
- The worker is full-time, part-time, or casual
- The work is short-term or seasonal
- The worker is a family member
-

Workers compensation in NSW is regulated by the State Insurance Regulatory Authority (SIRA) under the Workers Compensation Act 1987 (NSW), with policies issued through approved insurers and scheme agents (such as icare).

Under this legislation, a “worker” is broadly defined and can include:

- Employees (including apprentices and trainees)
- Working directors (unless a specific exemption applies)
- Certain contractors, particularly where:
 1. The contractor is paid mainly for labour
 2. The contractor works under your direction or control
 3. The contractor does not operate an independent business

As a result, many contractors must be included in workers compensation wage declarations, even where they hold an ABN and issue invoices.

A workers compensation policy generally provides cover for:

- Medical, hospital, and rehabilitation expenses
- Weekly payments to replace lost income
- Return-to-work and injury management assistance
- Lump sum compensation for permanent impairment
- Death benefits payable to dependants
-

Workers compensation premiums are calculated using:

1. Industry classification (WIC code) – reflecting the risk profile of the business
2. Claims experience – for existing employers
3. Declared wages – the core component of the premium calculation

Declared wages are the foundation of premium assessment, making accuracy essential.

Declared wages generally include all remuneration paid or payable to workers, such as:

- Gross wages and salaries
- Overtime
- Allowances
- Bonuses and commissions

- Directors' fees (where applicable)
- Payments to relevant contractors deemed to be workers
- Employer paid Superannuation
- Items generally excluded from declared wages include:
- Payroll tax
- Genuine expense reimbursements

When taking out or renewing a policy, employers must estimate wages for the upcoming policy year.

At the end of the period, insurers conduct a wage reconciliation or audit to compare:

- Estimated wages vs actual wages paid
- If actual wages are higher, an additional premium will be payable
- If actual wages are lower, a refund or credit may apply

Insurers may request payroll summaries, contractor invoices, BAS data, and financial statements to verify wage declarations.

Under-declaring wages—whether deliberate or accidental—can result in:

- Additional premiums and retrospective adjustments
- Penalties and interest
- Increased audit scrutiny
- Policy compliance breaches
- Potential exposure to uninsured claim costs

SIRA has enforcement powers where employers fail to maintain correct coverage.

To manage workers compensation obligations effectively:

- Base wage estimates on payroll and financial forecasts
- Review contractor arrangements regularly
- Notify your insurer if wages increase materially
- Maintain accurate payroll and contractor records
- Seek professional advice where worker classification is unclear

Workers compensation insurance is not optional. Declaring accurate, actual wages ensures compliance with legislation, correct premium calculation, and full protection for both workers and employers.

If your workforce structure or remuneration changes, your workers compensation declaration should be updated accordingly.

GLENREAGH HERITAGE RAILWAY

STEAMS AHEAD

Exciting progress is underway at Glenreagh Heritage Railway precinct. We hosted a special “steam up” of Locomotive 1919 in January to thank our wonderful volunteers who have worked tirelessly over the past year to bring the 148 year old steam train back to life! There is nothing quite like the sound of that steam whistle echoing across the valley.



Ray Smith PSM - Mayor Clarence Valley Council and Councillor Cristie Yager from Clarence Valley Council and Andrew Beswick from City of Coffs Harbour also attended this special event to see (and hear!) our progress. Thank you to the Grafton Scout Group for cooking up the bbq lunch for everyone.

We'd also like to thank Shannondale Steam Shed Inc for their assistance! Shannondale have moved into the big shed on the precinct. This is a group of steam aficionados who restore traction engines, steam sawmills and other steam engines. You may have seen them at Timberfest. They plan to display their traction engines, steam-driven sawmill, and steamrollers on Glenreagh Market day, the same day we plan to run the 1919 steam train for passengers, sometime this year!

When will the steam train be up and running?

There is a lot of work to do at the precinct before we can run the train for passengers and our volunteers are working hard to make it happen! Our goal is to have the train running this year, initially to Tallawudjah Creek Rd and back.

- The passenger carriage is currently being meticulously restored by our volunteers with assistance from a grant from Transport Heritage NSW.
- Fencing has been donated by Coffs Harbour Hardwoods and requires installing, sanding and painting.
- The platform needs refurbishing with railing and painting



- Adopt-a-Sleeper Fundraiser Over 300 railway sleepers need replacing. The community response to the Adopt-a-Sleeper fundraiser has been wonderful, raising almost \$8000!! For a \$100 donation, your name will be engraved on a stainless steel plaque (crafted by Cordy's Custom Engraving at Lowanna) and installed along the railway line at Glenreagh Heritage Railway. - Volunteers are currently installing new sleepers and have recently begun attaching engraved plaques to these sleepers. You can see your plaque on our website here: <https://tmrt.com.au/elementor-1509/>
- Planning has begun for the infrastructure around the precinct. Thank you to Locale Consulting for their work in creating a master plan for the precinct. This plan includes parking, fencing, toilets, seating, plantings, rainwater tanks, murals, accommodation in both refurbished railway carriages and other means and extensions to the Glenreagh Shed.
- Volunteers are always welcome. To get involved, email karen@tallowoodventures.com and register on our website tmrt.com.au.



Our other big project is the development of the Tallowood Mountain Rail Trail from Glenreagh to Ulong. We believe this 35km trail will be the most beautiful rail trail in NSW as it passes through 2 tunnels, over four historic bridges and through pristine rainforest gradually climbing up the escarpment to the mountain villages of Lowanna and Ulong. It will be FREE for everyone of all ages and abilities to enjoy!

Our small, volunteer team has been working hard behind the scenes meeting with neighbours, councils, local MP's, ministerial departments across tourism and regional development and National Parks.



Last year we applied for a federally funded regional grant for the survey and concept design phase and are now patiently waiting to hear if we are successful. This phase will cover surveys, environmental impact studies, cultural studies, weed clearing, assessment of infrastructure (tunnels, bridges and culverts etc) and the design of the rail trail (eg. trail surface, camping and picnic areas etc.)
